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Good Hymns

Good Hymns Are Memorable. There is something about song that engages the memory. How many song lyrics do all of us remember from the thencurrent radio repertoire when we were teenagers? There are a number of such songs that I can easily recall even though I don't want to!

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structural qualities that make them even more memorable. One such quality is rhyme. Many lines in Shakespeare's plays rhyme not because Shakespeare was attempting to be pretty, but because he wanted to make them easier for actors to memorize.

Similarly, rhythmic, metered language engages the memory in ways that ordinary writing does not. It's a big part of the reason why The Iliad, which was originally an oral composition, is in dactylic hexameter. The patterns helped Homer and his contemporaries to remember it.

Though we don't often consider the impact of all of this, it is widespread and profound. Unless a church has fallen into the trap of changing out its repertoire every two years to chase the praise-band flavor of the month, its worship services will inevitably teach its members to memorize hymns. I'm certain that nearly all Christians know many more hymn verses by heart than Bible verses.

What's more, these memories are uniquely resistant to the passage of time. I haven't done it so much recently, but in years past, I often spent my Sunday afternoons visiting older Christians in nursing homes to pray and sing with them. Naturally, these impromptu worship services were open to everyone, so we would be visited by a number of residents, many of whom clearly suffered from advanced dementia. They would shuffle (or be wheeled) into the room where we were meeting and sit staring blankly off into space until we began to sing. Then, people who may not even have known their own names anymore could sing "Amazing Grace" or "Take the Name of Jesus with You" start to finish, without missing a single word or note.

There is nothing so deeply graven on our hearts as

the hymns we learn in worship. When I see my children beginning to learn them, I know they are acquiring a treasure they will retain to the end of their lives and beyond.

Good Hymns Are True. If hymns were contentneutral, the ease with which we remember them wouldn't matter. However, as a spiritual guide, the hymns we know by heart are second in importance only to the Bible. Rare is the sermon that is as central to our faith as a hymn!

In fact, precisely because we know them so well, the hymns we sing are our first answer to the challenges of life. A bad hymn may not be able to meet those challenges, but a good hymn will be. When we encounter trial, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" reminds us to pray. When we are uncertain, "Give Me the Bible" directs us to the word. When grief overwhelms us, "Be Still, My Soul" reassures us that sorrow lasts for a moment, but joy in Christ will last forever. And so on, through hymn after hymn. Unless we are a people of song, we are no better equipped to face these things than the people of the world are.

Similarly, good hymns serve as a gateway to the Bible. On the way home from that singing, my wife and I were talking with our 6-year-old daughter, Zoë, about her favorite line in her favorite hymn. She replied that her favorite was the line in "In Christ Alone" that reads, "No power of hell, no scheme of man, can ever pluck me from His hand."

"Did you know that that's in the Bible too?" we asked her.

"Really? Wow; that's amazing!" she exclaimed, and from there, we spent the next couple of minutes talking about John 10:28 and Romans 8:38-39.
