When you read the Scriptures, do you focus on the familiar, easy passages, or do you seek sometimes to glean better understanding from those areas that seem more difficult? Acts is pretty straightforward and easy to understand, while Revelation is sometimes hard to read, not to mention understand. How have you approached these two studies? I know I have spent much more time reading and preparing for Revelation because of its difficulty. But let me turn this idea around for a moment. Should studying a less difficult book, like Acts, mean that we spend less time and effort in gaining an understanding of its precepts and teaching? While Acts may be straightforward and easy to grasp, it lays before us the foundations of our relationship to God and one another. These teachings are vital to our work for the Lord. Only with focus and diligence will we make these things a part of our life. We need to be diligent in all study. It is good to read the Bible daily, but we also need to dig deep in the well of God's Truth.
