The powerful Scriptures of God bolster our spirits every day and the privilege of prayer sees us through every sorrow and difficulty as we learn from **1Peter 3:10-12**. In the consolation of **Psalm 18:19**, we are deeply encouraged: "He brought me forth also into a large place; He delivered me, because He delighted in me."

Precious promises of the Bible gladden our hearts because the gracious God has said He will never leave us nor forsake us (**Hebrews 13:6**). For Mordecai the Jew was second only to King Ahasuerus, and great among the Jews and in favor with his many kinsmen, one who sought the good of his people and one who spoke for the welfare of his whole nation.

Casting off the unfruitful works of darkness (**Ephesians 5:11**), and putting on "the whole armor of God" (**Ephesians 6:13**), we will make the most of every moment that yet remains for us. **Psalm 56:11** offers us a great challenge: "In God have I put my trust, I will not be afraid; what can man do unto me?"
