Holding Back, or Holding On?

When we talk to people who are not Christians, and they have heard the gospel but delay obedience we often think or say, “they are holding back.”

There are people who come to our church buildings regularly and have heard the gospel over and over. Or, they have studied in homes with Christians. They know that God is real, that Jesus is His Son, that His death was a sacrifice for sin. They know Jesus arose from the dead and ascended to the right hand of God. They have listened to all the passages that teach the right response, so they know about confession, repentance and baptism. Yet, weeks and months and years go by ... no response.

While we often say, “they are holding back,” it may be more accurate to say, “they are holding on...” It’s not holding back, but holding on to something.

A former religion, a cherished relationship, a good measure of popularity, a family religious tradition, the cares of this world, some personally preferred sin, etc. It’s not that the alien sinner is holding back. They are holding on to something, not willing to give up something they cherish.

For example, the apostle Paul before his obedience, held on to his status in Judaism, but [on the road to Damascus] gave it up – to be a Christian, to have the excellence of the knowledge of Jesus Christ.
