your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' this is the first commandment. And the second, like it, is this: 'you shall love your neighbor as yourself.' there is no other commandment greater than these" (Mark 12:29-31).

When we have love for God and our neighbor, it will necessitate living by the principle found in the Golden Rule, "Therefore, whatever you want men to do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets" (Matthew 7:12). Or as we have coined the thought: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Such behavior will contribute to peaceful relationships. It will also demand honest dealings.
