Teaching the Word and not your opinions:

Some don't know the difference. The gospel unites people together with God. Opinions divide and separate. We all have our opinions. The more we stress them, the more likely we fuss and fight.

Loving the Lord more than yourself:

God wants His people to get along. Paul taught us to be "*diligent to preserve the unity*" (**Ephesians 4:1**). Division is easy. Unity is hard. Selfishness and pride are the roadways that lead to division. Denying self is the mark of a disciple of Jesus.

(In considering the four things listed by brother Shouse, I noticed a common idea that may not be evident at first glance. Each of the instructions given here deal with thinking of others rather than self and when I look back at Paul's writing in Romans 12 that seems to be a common thread. Much of the difficulties I have experienced could have probably been solved or at least made easier if those involved, including me, had given more thought to the others involved.

I often reference situations like checkout lines, highway driving, etc. so think of that kind of example for a moment. If you notice the person holding up the line is a mother trying to get groceries while keeping three kids under the age of 5 close to her, yet out of things on the shelves around them, does it affect your attitude toward the delay? I am confident that most of us are willing to "make allowances" in such a situation, unless we are totally focused on our own responsibilities or desires. While focus on my schedule might cause me to get irritable and complain about the delay, giving attention to her struggle can help curb those feelings.

What if I were to apply that same idea to every difficulty I encounter? Instead of keeping my focus on me, I need to consider the others who may be involved. Even correcting a brother or sister regarding sin can benefit from remembering they have fallen and need help. I might even remember that I have been a similar situation before and thus approach them from a standpoint of love rather than disappointment or disdain. DLH)
